LA Art Show 30th Anniversary: Honoring Our Longtime Exhibiting Galleries

The LA Art Show stands as Los Angeles's largest and longest-running art fair, marking an extraordinary milestone with its 30th anniversary edition from February 19-23, 2025, at the Los Angeles Convention Center. As we reflect on three decades of artistic innovation and cultural exchange, we recognize the foundations that have made this evolution possible—our longtime exhibiting galleries who have been instrumental in shaping the show's legacy and will once again be part of this historic anniversary celebration.

Under the leadership of Producer and Director Kassandra Voyagis, the LA Art Show has grown into a significant international presence, featuring over 100 galleries, museums, and nonprofit organizations from across the world. With nearly four decades of expertise, Daphne Alazraki Fine Art has evolved from Old Masters to contemporary works while maintaining its reputation for excellence. The


gallery's journey from European art fairs to its Manhattan base reflects its dynamic approach to fine art dealing and collecting.




